Invitation & Program Overview

You are cordially invited to attend Rhinology World 2009. This major international meeting will combine the International Rhinologic Society (IRS) meeting with the International Symposium on Infection and Allergy of the Nose (ISIAN), the spring meeting of the American Rhinologic Society (ARS) and basic allergy course of the American Academy of Otolaryngic Allergy (AAOA). This promises to be one of the world's largest gatherings of rhinologists and skull base surgeons, and a landmark event. The meeting will be a springboard for advances in patient care and scientific discoveries, and will provide ample opportunity for friendship and scholarly interaction.

The program incorporates rhinology, allergy, skull base surgery and facial plastic surgery. Each day, the tone will be set by a plenary talk and round table discussion from some of the distinguished international faculty. Thereafter, parallel sessions each day will include mini-seminars, scientific paper presentations, instructional courses, "great debates" and product exhibits. There will be demonstration dissections and the opportunity for participants to take part in hands-on cadaver dissections with instruction by international experts for a variety of different rhinologic procedures. Finally, there will also be an interactive resident knowledge-bowl competition with significant monetary awards. Residency training programs or countries are invited to submit their teams for this event.

The city of Philadelphia, also known as the city of "brotherly love," is the perfect setting for this historic meeting. Home to the Liberty Bell, and to Independence Hall where the United States Constitution was drafted in 1787, Philadelphia is famous not only for its history but also for its science, art and culture. The hotels chosen are conveniently located within walking distance of the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the Rodin Museum, the Franklin Institute and the Academy of Natural Sciences. A companion social program will underscore the historical and cultural possibilities in the City of Philadelphia and will include pre- and post-meeting tours to New York City and Washington, DC, designed especially with our international visitors in mind. In addition to a Welcome Reception at the Sheraton Hotel, a Gala Dinner featuring Nancy L. Snyderman, MD will be hosted at the Constitution Center. This center brings to life some of the important history of our nation.

We hope that you will join us, the societies and all of the faculty who have helped to put together this exciting opportunity to gain further knowledge in the field while enjoying the social interaction and historic Philadelphia. We believe it will be a most worthwhile meeting and a truly memorable experience. Course Information

Overview

The aim of this combined international meeting is to provide a forum for the presentation of contemporary concepts in the areas of rhinology, allergy, skull base surgery and facial plastic surgery in an environment which allows for interaction and discussion with the renowned international faculty. The focus of the four-day event will be on medical and surgical advances in the rhinologic field. Difficult cases, prevention, diagnosis and management of complications arising from sinus disease and surgery will be emphasized.

Each day of the program will begin with a plenary session followed by a round table discussion, certain to catch the interest of all participants. The remainder of each day will provide attendees the opportunity to sample a wide variety of topics and experience a variety of instructional methods ranging from instructional courses and mini-seminars to great debates and scientific paper presentations. All of these sessions are offered in an "open" format with no pre-registration required.

Laboratory Dissections

Pre-registration (additional fee) required. Registration for this portion of the program is available to practicing physicians. The objectives for the laboratory dissections are to help familiarize participants with the currently available instrumentation and the handling of equipment, as well as, exposing them to the latest technology while enabling them to explore the surgical anatomy through hands-on dissection. Two physicians will be assigned to one fresh cadaveric specimen for each dissection. An ample ratio of instructors to registrants will be provided to assure a positive learning experience.

All laboratory dissections will be conducted offsite. Bus transportation to and from the Sheraton Hotel conference center will be provided. Laboratory sessions are very limited and pre-registration is required; please register early (only one session per participant).

American Academy of Otolaryngic Allergy (AAOA) Basic Course

RhinologyWorld 2009 presents a unique opportunity for physicians to participate in an AAOA Basic Course while also availing themselves of the many cutting edge lectures and surgical workshops offered during the combined international rhinology meeting. Each afternoon, portions of the Basic Course will be presented for those who choose this registration option. Additionally, the general scientific sessions feature panels and free papers related to allergy and related to clinical management issues.

Accreditation

Rhinology Bowl

This interactive knowledge-bowl competition is open to residents only. Residency training programs and/or countries are invited to submit teams for this event. The competition format consists of NCAA style brackets divided into continents or hemispheres. Questions will be multiple choice, covering "Medical and surgical management of all rhinology—from the tip of the nose through the skull base."

Each team will consist of two (2) residents, with one alternate permitted. Only two residents per team will compete in any one match—no substitution will be allowed during a match round. Any post graduate year resident is allowed. An individual who has graduated from the residency program is not permitted to register. A residency program/ country may register more than one team. Pre-registration is required. A registration form, found at www.rhinologyworld.com, will be completed by the program director or resident and emailed or faxed to Cathy Lafferty no later than April 1, 2009. Contests will be conducted throughout the four day meeting, culminating in the Rhinology Bowl Championship to be held on Sunday afternoon to close out the event. Monetary prizes will be awarded to the winning teams, to be divided evenly among team members:

1st Place: \$5000 • 2nd Place: \$3000 3rd Place: \$2000 • 4th Place: \$1000




